At South, every horizon is yours to claim, and wherever you want to succeed, you'll find the connections to make it happen at the Flagship of the Gulf Coast.

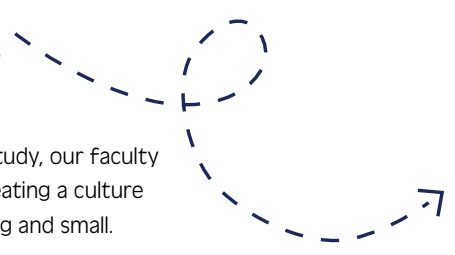

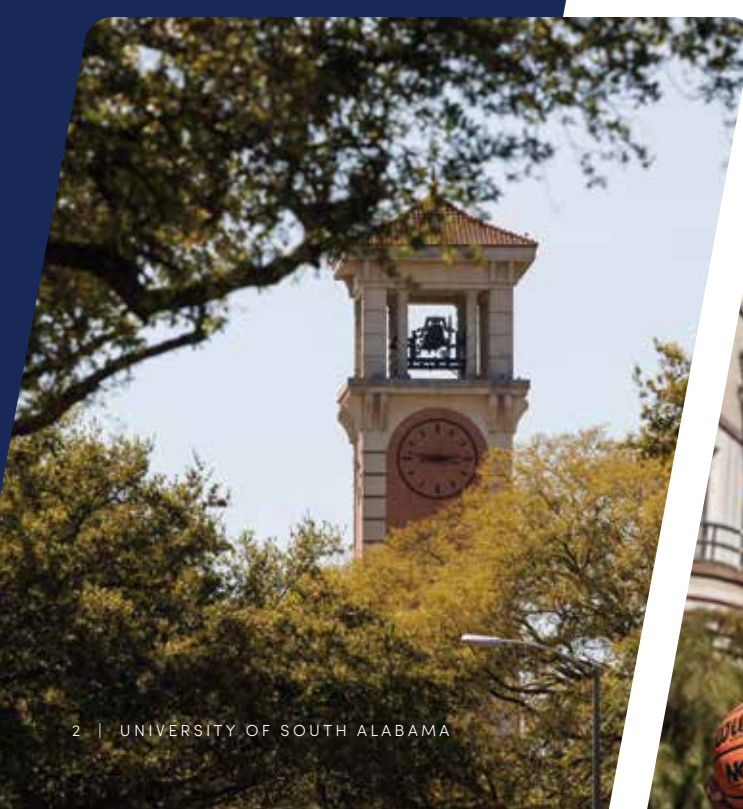
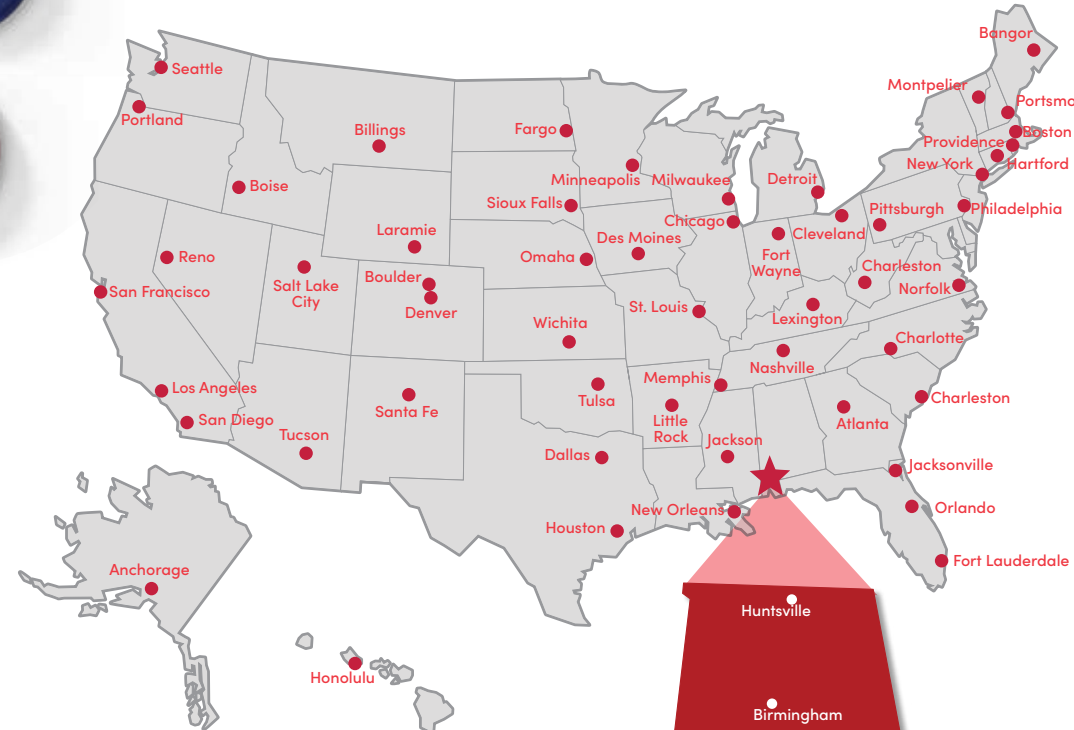

Admissions and Enrollment Application Process

Students can apply for regular or test-optional admissions. Test-optional students may be asked to provide additional materials. Test-optional students are reviewed based on high school GPA, rigor/performance in advanced courses (AP, IB, honors, etc.) and leadership qualities. Students who fail to meet admissions standards will be asked for additional information and will be reviewed by a committee.

Application Process

- 1. Apply online at SouthAlabama.edu/Apply.** With over 115 academic programs, there is something for everyone.
- 2. Submit test scores and transcripts.** Send ACT or SAT scores and an official transcript to the USA Office of Admissions.
- 3. Acceptance.** Applicants will be notified of acceptance through email and the admissions portal.
- 4. Live on campus.** Apply to live on campus at SouthAlabama.edu/MYUSAHousing.
- 5. Register.** After signing up for Orientation, an Academic Advisor will schedule an appointment to register for classes.
- 6. Attend Southbound.** You did it! Join us for Southbound, your new student orientation. You are now part of the Jaguar family.

Financial Aid

Be sure to submit your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at FAFSA.gov during your senior year. Financial assistance can help make a college education possible, and we are here to help you and your family with this opportunity. Financial aid is awarded annually for the academic year, which begins each August. The University uses FAFSA to evaluate students for federal and need-based aid.

Scholarships

Scholarships are awarded to incoming freshmen based on their test scores and high school/college GPA. For more information on specific requirements, deadlines and a full list of scholarships, visit SouthAlabama.edu/Scholarships.

USA offers scholarships beginning at \$2,000 for students who chose to apply test-optional. Those scholarships are awarded on the basis of GPA, course selection (honors, AP, etc.) and a variety of other holistic factors.

In addition, South offers need-based funding to admitted students who qualify through FAFSA. These awards are made after initial scholarship consideration, so it is possible to receive one award and then a few weeks later another.
